Digging Deeper

4. As part of the ancient Near Eastern culture, Genesis contains a series of genealogies, as in chapter 5. What purpose do these genealogies serve?

5. Why are there seemingly unimportant people mentioned in this genealogy? How is each person listed necessary to fulfilling God's promise from Genesis 3:15?

6. What do you think about the incredibly long lifespan Adam and his descendants enjoyed? What advantages and disadvantages would there be in living that long?

7. What truth from Genesis is underscored by the refrain, "and then he died"?

8. If the line of Cain focuses on sin, what does the line of Seth focus on?

9. What does it mean that Enoch walked with God in verse 22?

10. Who else in Scripture is it said that they never died? (2 Kings 2:11) What does Hebrews 11:5 say about why Enoch was "taken up?"
